

MHS Inventory Update

An excerpt from Dana Frear's "History of Minnetonka Town"

With the upcoming spring floods expected on Minnehaha Creek, here is an interesting excerpt from local historian Dana Frear's "History of Minnetonka Town", published in the Deephaven Argus Feb. 15, 1952. (We recently discovered it in his notes during our Inventory Project.) He describes a violent incident on Minnehaha Creek in 1893 where there were many disagreements among the local residents about where the dam should be placed and how high the water level should be. This effected the Lake Minnetonka property owner's lakeshore levels, the local farmers wells, and flooding on Minnehaha Creek shoreline properties:

One night in 1891 the old dirt dam washed out so completely that its repair was considered in advisable, and it was abandoned. This was supposed to be an act of nature, but it was man-made. The names of the culprits is known. (But were not named in this article). In its place a wooden suspension bridge was erected to replace the dirt road over the dam, and a new dam was built under the Chapter 381 Special Laws of 1891... in order to maintain a uniform height, not to be above extreme high water mark of waters in the Lake and not less than two feet above the then present level of water which was 13 feet 3 inches below the top of the main piers of the bridge over the Narrows between the main Lake and Grays Bay. (The old dam was where Plymouth Road intersects Minnetonka Boulevard today.)

In 1893, the county erected a new dam 100 feet above the old dam at a cost of \$2,000. The new dam was constructed of 4x12 inch planks on a foundation of timber cribs allowing the water to flow over the top of the dam. Then the stream below the dam became a rushing rapids and quite deep and swift, with many good swimming holes along the way. These gates, used to regulate the flow of water, were chained and locked down to prevent their being opened by unauthorized persons when the water was needed to maintain the Lake at the required level.

Soon after being built, the chain was broken and the gates were opened, so the county sent a deputy sheriff to guard the gates. Peter Schussler, who needed the water to run the Globe Flour Mill that he owned on Minnehaha Creek just east of Hopkins, and Arthur Boyce, a nearby farmer who needed the water for his livestock, went to Minnetonka Mills to open the gates. They found the deputy on guard with a gun. He refused to permit them to open the gates. They maneuvered around and grabbed the deputy and took his gun away from him. While Boyce held him, Schussler opened the gates and threw the gun into the rushing stream flowing through the sluice-way several feet deep. The deputy jerked away from Boyce and jumped into the water to rescue his gun. Not being able to find it, he climbed into his buggy soaking wet and drove back to town. The gates were then closed to recover the gun, which was turned over to the county auditor when the sheriff refused to accept it. No further attempt was made by the county to guard the gates.

There followed many lawsuits for property damage, (detailed in Dana Frear's History), after the dam was rebuilt in 1893 until it rotted away over the next five years. In 1897 the county was authorized by the Minn. Supreme Court, (83 Minn. 464), to construct a dam at Grays Bay to maintain the water in the Lake at a uniform height. Over a dozen property owners on the Creek between Grays Bay and Edina filed claims for damages, contending that the dam so lowered the water in the Creek as to greatly injure their property. Damages totaling \$13,800 were allowed for them, including \$1500 for C. H. Burwell.
